FIRST READING Isaiah 25:6-9

Isaiah sees a vision of the end of days, when God will gather all people on God's holy mountain and will prepare for them a rich feast. At this hanquet God will wipe the tears from all eyes. And there will be no more sorrow, for God will destroy death itself.

- ⁶ On this mountain the Lord of hosts will make for all peoples a feast of rich food, a feast of well-aged wines, of rich food filled with marrow, of well-aged wines strained clear.
- ⁷ And he will destroy on this mountain the shroud that is cast over all peoples, the sheet that is spread over all nations; ⁸ he will swallow up death forever.


The church office will be operating remotely on Tuesday, Nov. 5. First English will serve as a polling place for the election.
